

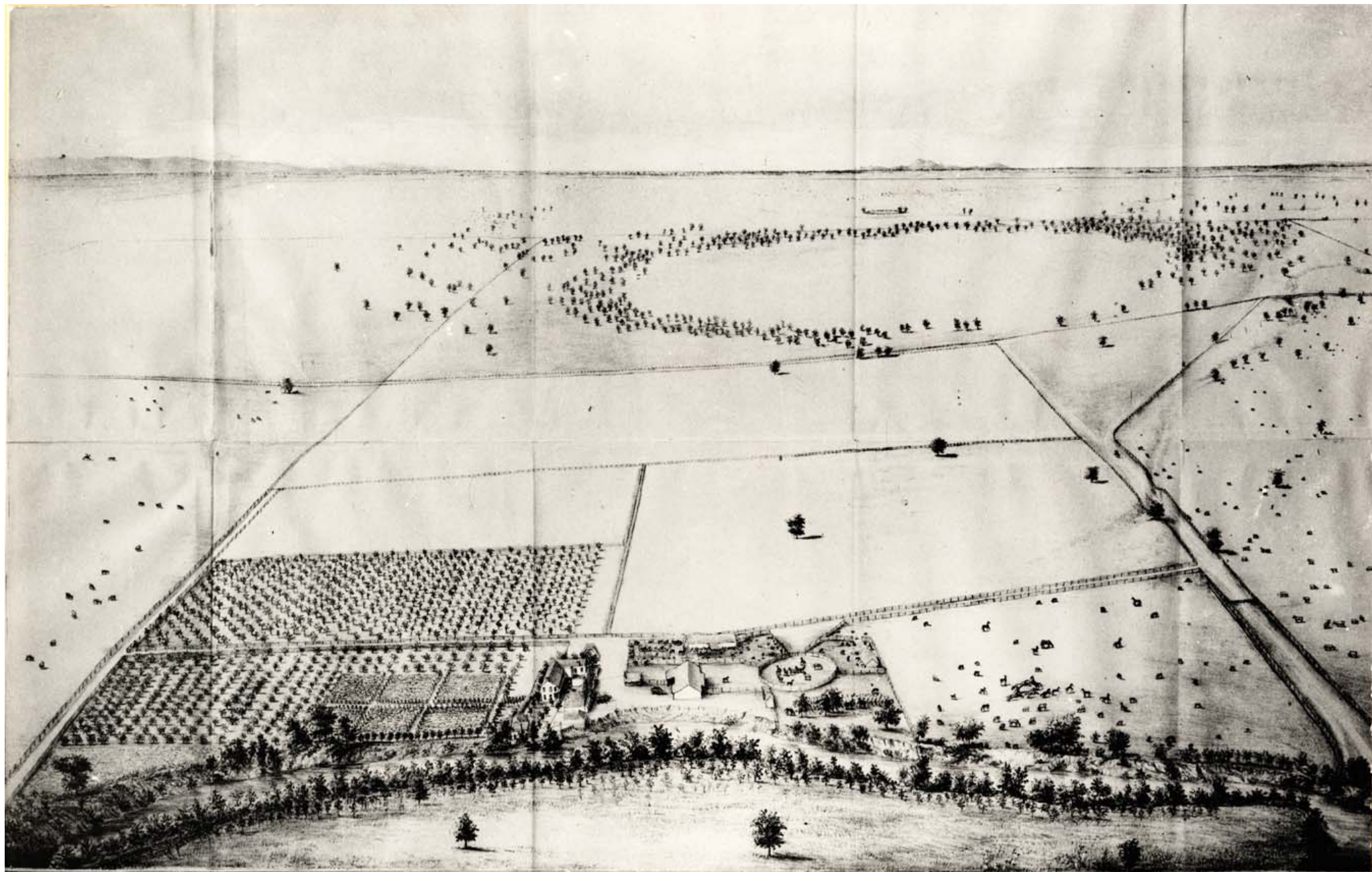
1858 drawing of the Jerome Davis farm on which a grid for a “Davisville” was laid out (in the far-right of the drawing).

Because of bad weather and other factors Davis’ farm was mortgaged, failed, and the foreclosed mortgage bought by the California Pacific Railroad (the “Cal-P”).

Planning to create a town in which grain could be purchased and the shipped on the new train, in late 1867 the Cal-P owners hired the local postmaster, William Dresbach, as its agent to carry out this plan.

Dresbach moved from the south bank of Putah Creek and took over the then-vacant buildings of the Davis farm.

Before the new Davisville grid become operational the almost-ten buildings of that farm housed various expectant enterprises and became a lively scene. In this sense, Davisville gestated in farm sheds before it was born on a new town grid.

The very first Davisville?

Detail from the **1858 Davis farm drawing** (above) showing nine buildings that are reported to have been occupied in the expectation that a town grid named ‘Davisville’ would soon be laid out just a few hundred yards northeast of this farm site.
