Principal's Letter

Parents,

I appreciate your responses to my PTA letters. It is heartening to know there are folks out there reading and thinking about some of these more complex topics. Many thanks!

Yes, A New Year. . . I often think we use the word Happy in a way that perhaps is not meant. When we say be happy or Happy New Year. What do we mean? One cannot be happy all of the time. This use of the word happy on so many occasions tends to bring forth a vision of a slightly manic personality.

But I do believe that we want a life that has depth of meaning- a life that provides all the stresses and subsequent contentment as we face those stressors and learn to control or vanquish them. I like to use the word flourishing in regard to this deep contentment. Not every day is beautiful and full of happiness. But going home or being home and having this sense of improvement, growth, care and attention to what we do every day to improve our life and the lives of others is vastly rewarding. Now that is flourishing.

Poco a poco, our staff is looking at student work a bit differently. They want to see evidence of what our children learn and what assists in this learning. They also want to ensure that they as individuals have solid ways to measure their own progress as educators. Student work helps them with this. Our teachers are working to provide more consistent expectations for every teacher of a specific course.

For example, if there are three teachers teaching Biology, they want to ensure that no matter what teacher a student gets, he or she will be exposed to the same concepts. These concepts will be assessed in similar fashion. This is not to say that all assessments will be exactly the same, but the ideas assessed will be. Our Common Core Standards (replacing the STAR or CST test in 2014-15) will require specific understanding of various concepts. Teachers and administrators are currently getting training in this area.

This week, I had a lovely talk with a parent. We delved into the area of what is best for our children. As we all know our children often feel stressed and our job is to show them how to live a good life despite all the pressures life provides. She said a wonderful thing, "All your children need is a job they love and a good mate." It is what she didn't say that was so heartening for me. She did not say, "My child must get into a prestigious college" or "My child must have a good paying job." She spoke about this contentment I mention above.

May your holiday be filled with contentment; have a Flourishing New Year!

DHS PTA Bylaws Update

The DSHS PTA Executive Board approved several amendments to the bylaws and standing rules of the DSHS PTA last school year. The bylaws were last amended in June 2007. Following PTA procedures these amendments have been approved and signed by Shirley Gold of the California State PTA Parliamentarian on November 30, 2012. The next step is to present the bylaws and standing rules for questions at the January 9 PTA meeting and for vote at the Feb. 6 PTA meeting at the DSHS Library at 7:30 p.m. PTA members must be notified at least thirty days in advance and a two-thirds (2/3) vote at the Association meeting is required to adopt the amendments.

A short summary of the proposed amendments is included below. A second more comprehensive list of the amendments with explanation may be found on the PTA website, at http://www.dhspta.org/ pta-board/minutes/pta/dhspta_revised-bylaws, along with the amended bylaws as approved by the State PTA Parliamentarian.

The following amendments are proposed to the Davis Senior High School PTA Bylaws. They are:

1) Page 3, Article IV: Section 4: Increase dues for PTA membership from \$10.00 to \$15.00. The PTA dues have not been increased since before 2005. Also, two years ago the portion of our dues that must be paid as fees to the State and National PTAs increased from \$3.55 to \$4.05. 2) Page 5, Article V: Section 2: Increase the Vice Presidents from two to three. The third VP shall serve as the Membership Chair. This position collects membership dues and the Parent In Education (PIE) donations. Hence the position should be an Officer in order to be covered by PTA insurance. Page 8, Article VI: Section 3: Add Membership Chair duties for third VP. Page 14, Article VII: Section 5b: The additional VP increases the Association meeting quorum from 13 to 14. Page 16, Article VIII: Section 7b: The additional VP increases the Executive Board meeting quorum from 6 to 7.

3) Page 9, Article VI, section 5 d: Change language to: "Receive a report of the deposits from the financial secretary" because the Financial Secretary makes these PTA deposits.

4) Page 9, Article VI, section 5 g.: Add First Vice President as authorized to sign checks.

5) Page 10, Article VI, several sections: Clarify the duties of the Treasurer and Financial Secretary. For example, to conform to current practice, strike "remit at once to the treasurer" and change "deposit slip" to "deposit report".

6) Overall: Change use of chairmen to chair.

SAT Preparation Workshop

A workshop stressing SAT test-taking strategies and good use of time will be presented in February and March by Davis Adult School. The class is for high school students who are preparing to take the SAT college entrance exam. The SAT college entrance exam tests grammar and usage, reading comprehension of short passages, and content from third-year high school math. Instruction will include review of vocabulary and math concepts, when to make an educated guess, and how to pace yourself.

The class is limited to 24 students and is offered Wednesday evenings 6:30 - 8:30 pm February 13, 20, 27, and March 6 on the Davis High School campus. Counselors' Corner

Our seniors have submitted their applications to colleges or are beginning the process of applying to community colleges, vocational training programs, or military service. We now begin the process of working with our juniors to make sure they are prepared to start the college application process in August 2013. We will be meeting with all the American Literature classes in April/May to provide college exploration assistance with Naviance. Letter of Recommendation packets for private colleges must be submitted to counselors and teachers from October 1 – 31 (letter of recommendation packet is located in Naviance in document library).

The SAT scores for the October and November SAT tests have been downloaded into each student's Naviance account. Students can view the scattergrams to see how they compare with previous students who have been accepted, denied, or waitlisted at various colleges. Students can also view websites of colleges to see how their SAT scores and college GPA compare to the average acceptance rates. Scholar-ships descriptions and applications can be viewed in Naviance.

Students who plan to take non-DJUSD courses for inclusion on their transcript need to request an approval form from their counselor. Students may take up to 10 credits at a non-DJUSD school for (a.) courses taken to meet high school graduation requirements and/or (b.) courses taken to meet minimum "a-g" college entrance requirements (as per school board policy). Students may take as many non-DJUSD courses as they want for enrichment (these courses are not placed on the transcript). All non-DJUSD courses must be completed by the end of fall semester of the senior year.

Note: Students may no longer take US History 310 & 311 or US Government and Economics at community college because this amounts to 20 credits, which exceeds the 10 credit minimum. Students can take these courses at non-DJUSD online high schools for the 10 credit maximum. (Contact counselor for further information.)

Program planning for the 2013-14 school year begins February 13 for DSHS. Students will have from February 13 to March 17 to make their decisions about courses for next year. On February 28, Open House will be held from 5 pm to 7 pm. The format of Open House will be different this year. Students and parents will be able to explore the various course options, ask teachers questions about course rigor and content, and obtain detailed information about AP/honors courses and special programs to assist them in making appropriate course selections.

As we conclude fall semester and have a fresh start with spring semester, we want to remind everyone that the key to success in classes is regular attendance, being on time for class, completing classwork as assigned, turning in homework when due, and asking teachers questions when confused. We are all here to support our students in being successful in high school. Best wishes for a Happy New Year.

<u>Financial Aid Materials</u>: The Career Center has many up-to-date financial aid resources, including the newest "Fund Your Future" workbook and FAFSA worksheets. Come to the Career Center for these and other financial aid materials.

FAFSA and Cal Grants: All seniors planning to attend college who would like to be considered for federal and state financial aid need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students can complete the FAFSA at www.fafsa.gov between January 1 and March 2. For questions about the FAFSA, contact the Career Center at 757-5400, ext. 140, call the FAFSA Help Line at 800-433-3243, or go online to: www.fafsa.gov.

In November, DSHS electronically submitted all seniors' verified GPA information to a secure California Student Aid Commission Cal Grant

website. This eliminates the need for students to complete a paper GPA Cal Grant verification form.

<u>Naviance</u>: Students and parents can come to the Career Center for help accessing and learning about the high school's Naviance computer program. Naviance is an easy-to-use, web-based resource that contains a wealth of information for college and career planning.

<u>Scholarships</u>: The Scholarship Bulletin is available in the Career Center, the Naviance computer program, or on the Career Center's webpage (on the DSHS website, click on counseling, click on Career Center, click on Scholarship Bulletin). Many scholarships provided by the local Davis community for Davis Senior High School students will be available in the Career Center beginning in January. Students are encouraged to apply for these local scholarships!

Why Do Teens Lie? What Can Parents Do?

Adam is a sophomore, and his best friend, Charles, is 8 months older and already has his driver's license. His junior operator's license makes it illegal for him to drive with friends in the car for his first six months, but he often does it anyway. Adam's parents have forbidden him to drive with Charles – a rule which feels very restrictive to him. After school, a group of boys were heading out with Charles to attend a tournament soccer game in a nearby town, and Adam couldn't stand it anymore. After telling his mom that he would be spending the afternoon at school working on a group project for his English class, he hopped into Charles' car with the rest of the boys and spent the afternoon at the game. When, in front of his mom, his next door neighbor mentioned having seen him at the game, it didn't take his mom long to start asking pointed questions. He was caught redhanded in his lie.

Sara's parents had a rule that she was not permitted to go to kids' homes without an adult present. She was a senior in high school and, as she was a pretty straight-laced kid, she found most of her parents' rules didn't interfere with her activities. But one Saturday night her group of friends was planning to go to Marc's home, and she knew that his parents were away. She went too, and everything worked out fine... no big deal. But a few days later Sara's mom was speaking to another parent and discovered that Sara had not been where she had told her mother she was on Saturday night. Sara was caught in her deception. Why had she lied?

Any parent who has caught their child in a lie knows that sinking, sick feeling you get in your stomach. Your relationship is based on trust, and the wound feels very deep when that trust is breached. Lying isn't always what it seems, though. It may not mean your teenager is embarking on a lifetime of deceit and dishonesty. There are three fundamental reasons why otherwise respectable teenagers may lie to their parents. One is a developmental issue, one is a communication issue and thirdly, it's a test.

Developmental reasons: As teenagers grow, they face a developmental imperative; they must separate from their parents and learn to function, thrive and compete in the world of their peers. This means they must transition from a family-centric view of their world to a peer-centric view. When parents view it this way, it is easier to see a teenager's process of separation and understand the adolescent drive to become independent, masters of their own lives. There are times when the world of teens' peers becomes more compelling than the "pull" from parents. A teenager is likely to periodically face scenarios where s/he finds it more compelling to give credence to personal choice and his peer group than to listen to (or obey) a parent's instruction. "Who is actually in control in my life, my parents, or me?" teens may ask. From the teenager's perspective, there are times when making his own choice isn't lying as much as it's a matter of responding to a greater priority... his own voice. At some point, and in some situations, a teenager may actually feel compelled to go against parents' orders simply to establish independence; a sense of "I am separate from you; I can make my own decisions." In this context, you can see that lying can be viewed as a developmental issue, not a moral one.

<u>Communication problems</u>: Lying can be a result of a communication problem. This occurs when a teenager expects that her point of view will not be respected or heard. While sometimes kids don't ask because they don't want to hear your answer, it could also reflect the quality of parent-teen communication. When a parent denies the recognition of a teenager's growing independence and good judgment, you may be hurting your relationship.

Honest conversations between parents and teenagers aren't always easy, and will sometimes cover ground that can make parents uncomfortable. It sounds great to have real open and honest communication with your teenager, but this can actually create some sticky issues at times. What if your teenager wants to tell you that he drinks at parties? Could you handle it if your daughter told you she wants to go on birth control? How much honesty can you tolerate? Honesty is essential if you want to truly be a reliable resource for your teen. But understand this can be tricky, too. And if you can't really tolerate honesty you may force your teen into a lie – unless of course your teen doesn't have anything to lie about. Many parents find the issues they confront with older teens get pretty difficult to manage as the best solutions aren't always clear. At any rate, your teen's degree of honesty may reflect on your ability to communicate openly with your teen.

Testing boundaries: Teenagers sometimes need to test the boundaries that support them. They are often chafing to expand their independence and the areas of their life in which they are free to explore. Testing the boundaries allows them to test you and the quality of your relationship. Teenagers may be asking: "Are you watching? Am I important enough to you for you to be aware of what I do? How far can I push that? Am I clever enough to get away with this? What are the consequences if I break this rule? Will you really enforce it?" Kids want to learn about you, about your relationship with them, and they sometimes feel safer when they know where the boundaries of their freedom lie.

What's a parent to do? Teenagers may not be conscious of it, but there can be underlying reasons that drive their disobedience. So, while it is upsetting when you learn that you may not truly be able to trust your teenager, this background knowledge should help you understand what's really going on. (continued on page 7)

NURSE'S NOTES

Almost one-quarter of the nation's high school seniors say that they have smoked marijuana in the past month, and just over36% admit to using the drug in the past year, according to the 2012 Monitoring the Future Survey. Researchers at the University of Michigan who conducted the annual survey found 6.5% of high school seniors smoked marijuana daily.

Among 10th graders, 3.5% say they use marijuana daily, while 17 % report using the drug in the past month, and 28% in the past year. "We are increasingly concerned that regular or daily use of marijuana is robbing too many young people of their potential to achieve and excel in school or other aspects of life," National Institute on Drug Abuse Director Dr. Nora D. Volkowsays.

"THC, a key ingredient in marijuana, alters the connectivity of the hippocampus a brain area related to learning and memory. In addition, we know from recent research that marijuana use that begins during adolescence can lower IQ and contribute to reduced cognitive abilities during adulthood." The survey of approximately 45,000 eighth, 10th and 12th graders found fewer students perceive marijuana as harmful, compared with previous years reports. Researchers found 41.7% of eighth graders view occasional use of marijuana as dangerous, and 66.9 % view regular use as harmful. These rates are the lowest since the survey began asking this age group about their perceptions of marijuana in 1991.

Among 12th graders, 20.6 % view occasional marijuana use as risky, the lowest rate since 1983. Among this age group, 44.1% view regular use as harmful, the lowest rate since 1979. "Yet another year of increases in childhood marijuana use is deeply disturbing as these can spell real trouble for young kids later on," Steve President and CEO of The Partnership at Drugfree.org said in a <u>statement</u>. "Heavy use of marijuana – particularly beginning in adolescence – brings the risk of serious problems and our own data have shown it can lead to involvement with alcohol and other drugs as well. Kids who begin using drugs or alcohol as teenagers are more likely to struggle with substance use disorders when compared to those who start using in life.

Here are some tips for parents to minimize lying from teenagers:

- Treat teens with respect. Listen to their point of view.
- Be willing to be flexible when appropriate.
- Negotiate.
- Safety should never be compromised. Know where you put your stake in the ground; be firm and consistent.
- Apply logical consequences.
- Confirm your love; let them know it is love that drives you, not a desire to be in control.
- Give them all the responsibility they can handle.
- As you give them additional responsibility, give them the opportunity to earn new freedom.
- Demonstrate the integrity and honesty you wish to see from them.

When in crisis: As logical and reasonable as these tips are, I will readily admit that these tips may not get the immediate results that you are looking for if you are in a crisis due to your teenager lying to you. When I first posted this article it generated many responses from frustrated parents who feel their teen's lying is out of control and they don't know what to do. Parents in this situation need real, concrete help. One option is to find a local therapist and bring your teen there for some joint sessions. A third party can be very effective in pushing you all forward in honest communication. Be prepared for some tough conversation. While a lying problem looks on the surface as though it just reflects on your teen, the family environment almost always gets scrutinized. There are reasons your teen is engaged in this behavior.... and in the case of serious problems you will need to work together honestly to get to the bottom of it and to find ways to build trust again.

California Scholarship Federation Spring Registration

The California Scholarship Federation (CSF) exists to promote and recognize high standards of scholarship, service and citizenship on the part of students in California schools. At this time, the approximately 1000 CSF chapters continue to foster the recognition, motivation, and education of academically talented students, and to promote among their chapter memberships the CSF ideal of service to their communities.

This spring, the two week registration period for students qualifying for CSF is from TUESDAY FEBRUARY 12 – FRIDAY FEBRUARY 15 and then from TUESDAY FEBRUARY 19 - FRIDAY FEBRUARY 22, 2013. Applications may be picked up beginning February 7 at the DHS library counter, the DHS Front Receptionist counter, in P-13 or in L-23.

To register, bring \$5.00 and your grade report from Fall Semester or a transcript to prove eligibility. If you cannot bring your grade report and must request a transcript from the counseling office, please keep in mind they may not be able to offer same-day service, so plan ahead. Zangle printouts are not accepted.

Registration will be every day during lunch in P-13. No applications will be accepted after lunch period on Friday, Feb 22. Students must apply and register in person; applications left in advisor mailboxes will not be accepted. Make checks payable to Davis High School CSF. (Note: Lines are notoriously long the last days of registration. It is recommended students take time to register early.)

For those doing community service, completed green hour sheets from Fall semester are due before or at the time you register for the Spring semester.
