## Principal's Message ... <br> Zena Ingles

It hardly seems possible, but the conclusion of the school year is just around the corner. In addition to the normal excitement of the school, the end of the academic year brings with it a number of events and celebrations that have become part of the Harper tradition. These include Day on the Green, Awards celebrations, the 9th Grade Trip and other activities. It is a busy time of year for Harper students and staff, and this time of year the days pass quickly.

It can often be difficult for students to remain focused on academics as we approach the end of the year. All of us tend to look forward to summer with great anticipation and may lose sight of the important work that is still to be done. We ask for your assistance in reminding students that many classes include final projects, presentations and exams. It is important that all our students finish the year strong and maintain a commitment to their academic progress.

We also ask for your help in "holding the line" with your student's behavior:

- Please monitor your student's dress as she/he leaves for and returns from school each day. (The very short shorts, low cut tops and distasteful messages on a student's clothing are no more appropriate now than they are earlier in the school year.)
- Be sure your student is arriving at school on time and is maintaining consistent attendance. (With fewer school days remaining, it becomes increasingly difficult for students to make up the work.)
- Monitor your child's "extra curricular activities." (I have been hearing of weekend parties where our students are left unsupervised and are engaging in illegal activities.) Please be sure you check on your student's whereabouts.
- Continue to talk with your student about making good choices. This is the time of year when young people, especially $9^{\text {th }}$ graders, forget that there are consequences for behavior. Remind them that each and every decision matters, and it is important to "stay the course."

As we approach the end of the year, I would like to thank you, the parents, for your support and assistance at our school. There are so many important events and programs that would not be possible were it not for the help of a highly committed staff and so many fine parents. Your willingness to share your resources and your support of our expectations for students is greatly appreciated!

We've gone from the very small to the very large and everything in between. We started at the beginning of third quarter with cells and ended with studying plants and animals. We have now moved on to studying Earth in the solar system.

Look forward to learning about planets, stars, and galaxies. We'll be ending the year with making a set of planetary (and other) trading cards, then enjoying some time with the Earth tilted towards the sun!!

8th Grade Science

April was full of cellular reproduction and genetics- just witness the cherry trees blooming outside and all the charts of mitosis and meiosis inside the classroom. Late April finds us taking STAR tests and starting our study of the many human body systems. This focus lasts until early J une as we apply previously-learned physical science phenomena to biological systems.

For example, we'll review the concept of pressure (force divided by area) while we study the circulatory system and measure our blood pressure. We'll also study levers and simple machines while we learn about our bones and joints. Dissections of sheep hearts, sheep eyes, and chicken wings also will occur. While we encourage all students to participate in these very rich hands-on experiences, we also make alternative assignments available.

A note from Mr. McKim to his students: Thank you to all my studentsfor your year-long dedication to improving your science education. When compared to all of my previous 19 years of students, I can easily state that this year's 8 th graders asked the most in-depth and well-considered questions. Your curiosity is alive and well! ## Swine Flu - H1N1 Precautions

The following information has been provided by Yolo County Public Health:
"It is important for people to continue to take common sense steps to protect themselves from spreading disease," states Dr. Joseph Iser, Yolo County Health Officer/ Director.
"Washing your hands frequently, sneezing and coughing into a tissue or your sleeve, and staying home when you are sick are important steps individuals can take to stop the spread of disease."

The symptoms of H1N1 influenza in humans are similar to the symptoms of regular human flu and include fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, headache, chills, and fatigue. Some people have also reported diarrhea and vomiting associated with human H1N1 flu.

Flu is generally spread by direct contact with germs from an infected person, from either uncovered coughs or sneezes or by touching something the infected person has handled.

People experiencing more than mild flu-like symptoms, particularly individuals who have recently traveled to M exico, should call their health care provider for advice. Anyone experiencing severe symptoms, such as trouble breathing, should seek medical care immediately.

Yolo County Public Health is coordinating with state and federal agencies to implement increased influenza surveillance and containment measures.

The emergency operation centers at the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention and the California Department of Public Health have been activated to investigate this outbreak. Yolo County Public Health is in frequent communication with area healthcare providers, city officials, and local schools.
