### D5. Boundary Description:

The Old North Davis Historic District includes the tier of blocks that run from G Street to B Street between  $5^{th}$  and  $6^{th}$  Streets that was incorporated into the city in 1871. It also includes the tier of blocks that run from G Street to B Street between  $6^{th}$  and  $7^{th}$  Streets that was known as Bowers Addition and was approved by the Board of Supervisors of Yolo County February, 1913. The district is bounded on the north by the center line of  $7^{th}$  Street between B Street on the west and G Street on the east. It is bounded on the east by the center line of G Street between  $7^{th}$  and  $6^{th}$  streets; and the alley between G and F streets between  $6^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$ . It is bounded on the south by the center line of  $5^{th}$  Street between the F-G street alley and C Street. It is bounded on the west by the center line of  $6^{th}$  streets and by the center line of B Street between  $6^{th}$  and  $7^{th}$ . See the boundary map, attached.

These boundaries encompass all of Bowers Addition developed between 1910 and 1950. It also includes all of the blocks located between the rear lot line of the east side of F Street and the center line of B Street which was incorporated into the City in 1871 except the 500 block of G Street. This tier of blocks remained undeveloped until the 1910s.

### D6. Boundary Justification:

The boundaries encompass those blocks of the city that were developed from the 1910's through the 1950's and which retain an almost unaltered, comprehensive collection of residential building types and architectural styles that exemplify the small town, University Farm era of Davis' history. It also incorporates the city's first suburban subdivision. Along with College Park (outside the City original boundaries), the Old North Davis area is the only part of the historic town that retains a concentration, continuity, and linkage of buildings and landscape features that represent this earlier era before Davis became a city and major University center.
